# A need for Climate literacy

In the current climate crisis, there's an urgent need for education to enable individuals, as agents of change, to acquire **knowledge**, **skills**, **values**, **and attitudes** that lead to green transition of our societies, as set out in the 2030 Agenda.

**Journalists play a vital role** in raising awareness about the impacts of climate change, informing public opinion, scrutinizing policy decisions and covering sustainable solutions to the climate crisis.



#### A need for Climate literacy

While climate coverage in newsrooms is rising globally, there is still a lack of integration of climate literacy into the curricula of Journalism and Communication Universities, namely in Portugal.

"You need more general climate literacy in newsrooms, just like news organizations at some point realized that they couldn't just depend on a few digital specialists but needed to increase everyone's digital literacy in order to stay relevant as an organization"

### Climate literacy: a challenge for newsrooms

#### **Most journalists**

- Don't feel confident explaining the details of climate change
- Fail to see the connection with climate change in everyday stories
- Have a hard time spotting misinformation and greenwashing

#### Media outlets face constraints

- Majority of journalists doesn't have a background in science
- Climate change is a complex topic and addresses all areas (politics, economics, sport, culture...)
- Newsrooms lack time and financial resources for training

#### Changes that news organisations are making to improve coverage further

Data from a survey of 303 media leaders in 53 countries for 'Journalism, media and technology trends and predictions 2023'.





### A need for Climate literacy



### A global call for Climate Education

• UNESCO reviewed the profiles of 20 countries on climate change communication and education and found that efforts are mainly focused at the <u>primary and secondary</u> education levels (90%).


 Fewer countries have frameworks to support climate change education in higher education and teacher training education

# A special call for climate literacy in Portugal

• The Climate Basic Law (2021) requires the government to promote the development of teaching material on climate change in higher education, respecting the autonomy of each institution



## If journalists play a vital role in:

- Informing citizens
- Exploring and understanding local impact of climate change
- Exposing misinformation
- Holding power to account
- Foster public debate

#### Journalism/ Communication Higher Education Institutions must take a leading role:

- Provide newsrooms with young journalists who have climate literacy as part of their basic training
- Foster collaboration between universities, media outlets, and environmental organizations
- Contribute to a broader culture of climate literacy

### The case for a Climate Journalism course in PT

#### WHY?

- Portuguese HEI had no dedicated course on Climate Journalism within Journalism or Communication Schools and Universities
- Climate change is more frequently included in the curricula of courses in the areas of health, architecture or engineering, than in journalism ones



#### **WHY ESCS?**

- Solid foundation in journalism principles and practices, with a focus on hands-on learning and real-world applications
- Journalism is an evolving field
- As newsrooms prioritize climate coverage, universities must also adapt to enhance climate literacy

Limited access to training (time and resources) in newsrooms



Address misconceptions about climate change


Identify reporting topics and credible sources
